Letters, loose business records, letter books, legal case  
files, drafts of legal decisions and other compositions, and  
copies of county records belonging to McDaniel and his family.  
Papers are divided into three series: I. Family Papers; II.  
Business and Political Papers; and III. Directorship Records.

Henry McDaniel, born Sept. 4, 1836, at Monroe, Walton Co.,  
GA, graduated from Mercer University in 1856, was admitted to the  
Georgia bar the next year, and practiced with his uncle,  
Dickerson Holliday Walker, in Monroe. He served in the 11th  
Georgia Regiment during the Civil War until, as Major, he was  
wounded in July 1863 and eventually sent to Johnson's Island  
Prison.

Released in 1865, he married Hester Felker of Monroe, GA, on  
Dec. 20. Henry continued his legal career and was elected to the  
Constitutional Convention of 1865 but was not able to hold office  
until after the Amnesty Act of 1872.

He served in the Georgia House of Representatives and,  
beginning in 1874, in the Senate before being elected to governor  
in 1883. It was during his administration that the new capitol  
was built, he chairing the Capitol Building Commission. In 1879  
McDaniel, together with Judge William M. Reese, Samuel Barnett,  
and Robert Toombs, authored an act creating the Railroad  
Commission. Throughout his career he was involved with the  
railways, working as governor to make agreements financially  
beneficial to the state and in private life serving as a director  
of the Georgia Railroad Banking Company, the Georgia Railroad  
Bank (Augusta, GA), and the Monroe Railroad Company.

For the last 30 years of his life McDaniel was a trustee and then chair of the Board of Trustees of the University of Georgia at Athens under Chancellors Walter B. Hill and David C. Barrow, Jr. Henry McDaniel died in his home at Monroe on July 25, 1926.

The majority of the records came to the Georgia Department of Archives and History from Emily (Mrs. H.D.) Tichenor, wife of Henry McDaniel's grandson, beginning in 1966 with two of the letter books and many pamphlets published by various branches of the state. In the 1970's Mrs. Tichenor and her sister-in-law, Mrs. Warfield, added the loose business correspondence, Ira McDaniel's journal, and all of the Henry McDaniel's Civil War letters and papers that make the book, *With Unabated Trust*, edited by Anita Sams. After Mrs. Tichenor's death in 1990, the McDaniel/Tichenor House in Monroe became the property of the Georgia Trust. In 1995 they transferred over 3 cu. ft. more material to the GDAH, including additional business papers relating to McDaniel and the Tichenor family papers up to the 1920's.

Published materials, mostly pamphlets, relating to the University of Georgia at Athens were transferred to that institution. Other state publications became a part of our Government Records series.

SERIES ONE: Family Papers, 1838-1931, 1947, and 1975. Two subseries. 163 folders. Original loose papers and printed material. 4 cu. ft. and 2 oversized folders.

The series is divided into two parts, the first and largest subseries (120 folders) being letters between members of Henry McDaniel's family; the second being mostly household business papers such as invoices and receipts.

The McDaniels had a long married life, over 60 years, and a long courtship before it. Loose papers document Henry's family back to his childhood and continue with his children up to after his death in 1926. The loose business papers do not begin until after Henry and Hester's marriage.

The subseries is made up of mostly letters. The first 23 folders are Henry McDaniel's C.S.A. records and his letters to Hester, his relatives, and children, Sanders and Gipsy. Because few of Henry's own letters have survived, some drafts of business letters and of various compositions or speeches are filed here together. Other business letter drafts are preserved loose with the correspondence they are answering or in letter books in Series Two.

The two folders of letters written to Hester during the Civil War were published as *With Unabated Trust*, ed. by Anita B. Sams, Monroe, GA, 1977. Many were edited, however, and those omissions are not always apparent. As a group they are probably the crown of the collection because they display McDaniel's political, legal, and classical education working in the service of ardent and enforced communication.

Twenty more folders are letters by Ira O. McDaniel (1807-1887), Henry's father, his other sons, and various Sanders and McDaniel relatives and friends. Ira's 1886 memoir, a 116-page volume, gives information about his life in South Carolina; Penfield, GA; early Atlanta; and Monroe, GA. Genealogical information is also included.

Felker family papers compose 17 folders: the few of Hester's letters to Henry that survive (the story is that she destroyed them herself); business papers and letters about and by her father, and siblings; letters from her friends; and letters to her children. Three folders are by or about her son Sanders McDaniel and his wife Anne Henderson.

Twenty folders are Gipsy McDaniel Tichenor's letters to her parents, from her friends and suitors, from a cousin, and to her own children, Henry and Hester Tichenor. The final 37 folders are Gipsy's correspondence with her fiance and husband, Edgar Tichenor; his letters to her; his school, teaching, and business records; and letters by their children.

Ira Oliver McDaniel, Henry's father, had emigrated from the Pendleton District, SC, to Penfield, GA, to teach at the Mercer Institute in 1833. He married Rebecca Walker of Monroe. The family of four boys, Henry, Ira, Philip Sanders, and Egbert, moved to Atlanta in 1847, and Henry graduated from school there before going to Mercer. Later Ira lived near Gainesville and was involved in The Allatoona Iron Works and other businesses.

While practicing law in Monroe, Henry met Hester Felker, daughter of Stephen Felker (1799-1887) and Malinda Harben (1817-1898), his second wife. Stephen, the father of 15 children, arrived in Walton County in 1824 from South Carolina. He was a contractor, wood-carver, cabinet maker, plantation owner, and private banker. Like most Southerners, his business seemed to suffer after the Civil War, and Henry was legally involved with the estate until well after the deaths of both his in-laws. Ironically, Stephen Felker had not originally approved of McDaniel as a suitor for his daughter. The Civil War delayed Hester and Henry's marriage even more. He entered the war as a first lieutenant in 1861, was appointed Quartermaster, and rose to Captain and then Major in 1862. On July 10, 1863, he was critically wounded at Funkstown, MD, and captured two days later when Confederate forces were forced to retreat. Left to recuperate in Maryland before being sent to Johnson's Island Prison in Ohio, Henry may well have survived the war by avoiding the rest of the battles and the miseries of camp life. With the help of cousin Emma Brent in Baltimore and other friends in Maryland he managed to continue his correspondence with Hester and his family until his release, July 25, 1865.

Henry and Hester were married Dec. 20, 1865, and continued to live in Monroe, surrounded by friends and relatives. Their son, Sanders (1867-1934) graduated from the University of Georgia and practiced law in Atlanta, marrying in 1895. Gipsy (1868-1939), their daughter, was educated at the Atlanta Female Institute and married Edgar S. Tichenor (1859-1933), a Mercer University professor, in 1896. Edgar became secretary of the Walton Cotton Mill, of which Henry was director, in 1900, allowing the Tichenors to live in Monroe also. They had two children, Hester McDaniel and Henry McDaniel Tichenor (1900-1965), the latter who continued as an officer in the Walton Cotton Mill after completing his education at Virginia Military Institute and The University of Georgia.

Series Two is organized into four subseries: 1. General Correspondence, 2. Individual Correspondence, 3. Letterbooks, and 4. Legal Case Records--including letters, invoices, legal documents, and draft memoranda from Henry McDaniel's legal and political careers. Because of the piecemeal way in which the collection was added to and has been arranged over the decades, some inconsistency is probably evident in filing. Many of the letters and invoices, especially for McDaniel's later years, may be considered family business. Some individual correspondence may be about railroad affairs documented in Series Three. The lines between Henry's legal work as business and work for family members are not always clear either.

Letters to Henry McDaniel, with occasional draft replies, arranged chronologically. Although most of the letters are single pieces of correspondence connected with McDaniel's legal work or political career, some correspondents undoubtedly wrote more than once and some letters concern more private business. Overlap in correspondent, topic, or type of letter occurs between these letters and those in Series One (Family Papers), Subseries 2-4 (Legal Case Records), and Series Three (Directorship Correspondence). A number of single letters of little note but by well-known persons, such as Lavender R. Ray, are found in these files. Letters by and about those of more consequence and lengthy strings of correspondence are filed in the next series, Individual Correspondence. The largest number of letters are those from people congratulating McDaniel on his election to governor in April 1883.

Because of personal qualifications, education, and his experience in business, law, and politics, Henry McDaniel was often asked to serve on or chair one board or another. His involvement with railroads dates at least from 1879 when he worked to form the Railroad Commission, but it is likely that he invested in them far earlier.

This series is divided into 1. Georgia Railroad and Banking Company Records, 2. Georgia Railroad Company Records, and 3. University of Georgia, Athens, Records. The difference between the Georgia Railroad and Banking Company and the Georgia Railroad Company is not always clear. According to a stock brochure (folder 3-1-10) the Georgia Railroad Company was incorporated in 1834, and the name was changed to Georgia Railroad and Banking Company in 1835. Regardless, both names were being used in the 1870's. Records were generally arranged according to letterhead used. Despite his graduation from Mercer University, it was the state University at Athens where McDaniel served on the Board of Trustees for nearly 40 years. When all other business had ceased in his public life, this last interest remained. His son, Sanders McDaniel, was a graduate.

"In 1892, in order to avoid excessive taxation, the banking business was divorced from that of the railroad, and the Georgia Railroad Bank was organized with capital stock of \$200,000. The entire stock, with the exception of a few shares allotted to the directors of the bank, is now owned by the Georgia Railroad and Banking Company." [Robinson-Humphrey-Wardlow Company brochure, 1916, folder 3-1-10] H.D. McDaniel was a director. Other related material by Leonard Phinizy, general counsel for the Augusta Southern Railroad, is filed in Subseries 3.2.

Some are McDaniel's own banking records. However, those of the Felkers are filed with their family papers in Series One, while the John Born bond (1868) and accounts (1879) are in folder 2-4-83.
